C.G. Jung:

"Archetypes belong to the realm of the activities of the instincts and in that sense they represent inherited forms of psychic behavior"

- ♦ A true living experience
- An idea in psyche
- ancient symbolic image
- Their home is in the collective unconscious
- Dynamic energy
- Autonomy
- Numinosity
- Psychic pattern
- In all cultures

We are born carrying them occurring as patterns of the Human Situation since primitive times!

Archetypes present themselves as personified: *"typical modes of apprehension"* (C.G.Jung)

How Do We Know Them?

- By Possession
- "Archetypes have an emotional possessive effect, that can blind us" (Hillman).
- We act out archetypal pattern of behavior under their influence
- They have both a light and a shadow side (positive and negative)

How do we act them out?

- Dreams,
- art forms,
- movement/dance,
- poetry,
- literature
- Overwhelming emotions:
- hate, rage, stuck, one sided, consumed, in love, powerful, powerless, grandiose, small

Who is There?

 In order to become aware of archetypal possession humans can do the psychological work by asking

"Who is there?"

- We discover "Who is there?" by the symptom experienced in the body and mind!
- Every symptom comes from the image of some archetypal situation.
